At the end of last month, I participated in a meeting with our Bishop to discuss how we could implement vital changes within our conference to address declining membership, declining attendance and declining participation. The conference has decided to focus on moving closer to Christ, to focus on transformational, outward facing, community driven ministries and to do so in a collaborative manner with our shared values. This involves refocusing on being the hands and feet of Christ in our community in new ways.

Sadly, it is not just our denomination that is facing this type of decline. Over the last many decades, attendance in most large Christian denominations have been in decline. There seems to be widespread agreement that underlying cultural changes were causing these declines.

One author who supported the cultural shift theory to explain what happened in our churches was the late Phyllis Tickle. In her writings, she speaks of semi-millennial tsunamis of change that shape religion and culture. She describes these great changes as occurring every 500 year or so, with shifts so overwhelming and so total, that the old ways are completely replaced

with the new ways. She goes on to say that one of the greatest and most transforming changes in this cycle occurred about 2000 years ago, known as the "Great Transformation". It was such a dramatic change that it is a pivotal point in our recording of time – it is marked as a shift in recording of time as "before the common era," and time after marked as the "after the common era." The era that gave us Christianity which resulted in radical, overwhelming changes that shook the ancient world and is still reverberating, although with a significantly reduced intensity.

We are now entering another cultural shift – a shift into post-modernity from the Modern Age or the Age of Reason. It was at the time of the Renaissance and the Protestant Reformation. About five hundred years later we have the next shift - from modernity to post-modernity.

So what has changed as we move from modernity to post-modernity? For one, we see a movement from strictly rational to more experiential. In the church, rather than praying for you – this group would reach a hand out to help you in time of need or crisis. There is a move from representative to participator. We also see a movement from word-based to image based understanding of our world for those that identify with a culture that is post-modernity. Images are as strong as words for those that embrace the post-modernity culture. The use of emoji images to express an idea or emotion is a good example, especially since this group embraces technology. As a side note, it is just this techno–savvy that allows for deinstitutionalization and a nonhierarchical organization that appeals to this group to exist that otherwise would be impossible without the internet and technology.

Those that continue to embrace modernity are stuck on defining their views based on words. There is also a move from individual to the individual in community. Again, in the church, those that are aligned in the post-modernity culture like to connect in community. They like to share and be with others. These connections are important to them. If one is steeped in modernity – these changes will be very hard to accept. As we move from modernity to post-modernity, we

see the culture has changed; however, the church has not followed suit. Church leadership goals are aimed at maintaining the institution based on old cultural norms. Along with the cultural changes experienced with post-modernity, there are also changes in how individuals look at church and in how their spiritual needs are satisfied. The term *Emergent Christianity* has been coined to describe those that embrace this postmodernity cultural shift in how they view the church and practice their faith. Generally speaking, this group looks for horizontal leadership. The traditional form of hierarchal leadership does not appeal to them. They do not want to be preached to. They would rather discuss their faith interactively in a setting more akin to a Starbucks environment rather than a sanctuary. They are generally far more inclusive in their gatherings than the traditional church and they are far more accepting of those that are marginalized in joining with them in worship than those of the traditional church. Since this group is technologically savvy - they would be

interested in such innovations as cyber church. They are not strong on church doctrine and have issues with the traditional church that forces it on them.

So how should we proclaim the good news going forward? If we wait for them to join us in the sanctuary we will probably never see them. Maybe our proclamation needs to be where people gather - bars, Starbucks, the gym - outside of where we traditionally would gather for worship. Maybe the proclamation should not be from one person or the evangelist or preacher or whatever title that we choose. Maybe it should be a discussion, an interaction of question and answers, followed by some quiet time for reflection. We see with these changes that it's not just preaching, it is also how we share this message in our community. Part of this is going outside the traditional sanctuary serving the community and giving of ourselves fully. Community meals and activities that are the occasion for coming together could serve as the catalyst for sharing the message. How we tell the good message and where we tell it seems make all the difference in world in our effectiveness.

Fortunately for us, our conference has seen the need for change and is actively engaged in addressing this pressing issue within the church. Within the next several months, details of this plan will be made available. I am looking forward to the positive changes that are planned and I believe that you will also as we journey into the future of our church!
