As we near the beginning of 2026, many of us are beginning to think about our New Year's resolutions. For 2025, the top New Year's resolutions focused on health, finances, and personal growth, with many people also aiming to organize their lives and improve mental well-being. While health and money consistently rank highest, goals like reducing stress, traveling, and giving back were also popular. However, try as we might, most New Year's resolutions fail, with many people giving up

within the first month (around 25-43%), and even fewer achieving them by year-end (around 8-10%). These high failure rates stem from unrealistic goals, lack of planning, and low willpower. Surprisingly, those who set resolutions are 10 times more likely to succeed than those who don't.

Rather than giving up on resolutions, maybe it is time to try a

different type of resolution. Maybe we should try resolutions that are spiritual in nature. The kind of resolution that will lead to abundant life without requiring any investment in high-cost gadgetry or memberships to succeed.

But the real question is, how do we get started on these spiritual resolutions? How can we start to make real changes in our spiritual life? One way is to start with few small changes and then allow the Holy Spirit to lead us to further change. Once we open the door to the Holy Spirit of the Lord, it will take the lead and guide us.

To begin with, try taking a rest from all the media noise that bombards us on a regular basis. Although we need to be responsible, informed citizens, we don't need to overwhelm our senses with all the noise of this world buzzing in our heads. We need to replace this time with a time

for prayer and reflection. Because we are called to constant prayer by our Lord, this is one of the most effective spiritual disciplines. We see in Romans 12:12 that we are called to, "Rejoice in hope, [to] be patient in tribulation and [to] be constant in prayer." This action is linked to the first part of the great commandment in Mark 12:30, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength."

Another step in this journey is to replace focusing on our own needs and issues with focusing on the needs of our brothers and sisters around us, and connecting in a way that is meaningful with true love and compassion. We can do this by showing kindness and patience at all times to our brothers and sisters. At the same time, we should all work to eliminate envy and boastfulness, arrogance, and rudeness in all

that we do. We should reach out to those that have the greatest needs. We need to remain steadfast in this care at all times. This is the call that we receive from the second part of the great commandment found in Mark 12:31, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." I know this is not easy and can be a challenge, especially when we practice this in every interaction that we have in our lives! Not just in church, once a week for an hour, but for every waking moment in our lives for as long as we live!

We must also take time in our lives for the study of scripture. We need the guidance found in the gospels, which through the ministry of Christ, reveals to us the love God has for us and all of his great creation. The examples set by Christ in his earthly ministry give us the example for leading Christian lives in this very secular world that we

live in today. We must read the living word of God and allow it to speak to us on a daily basis. We must meditate on the readings and internalize them in a way that allows us to understand the full meaning for us in today's world. By regularly reading scripture, tied to a Bible study where we freely discuss scripture, we are opened to many new interpretations and possibilities gained from the diversity found in our Christian community.

Separating ourselves from earthly things requires us to not only give of ourselves, but to joyously and with a happy heart, make offerings to the church and other charitable organizations. This frees us from the desire to accumulate earthly possessions which allows us to focus on being the servants of God in this very broken world. In Luke 6:38, we are told, "Give and it will be given to you."

A final step is to attend church services on a regular basis and to take part in the sacrament of communion, whenever it is offered. In our church attendance, we stand in the holy presence of God and by partaking in communion we are united with God in a holy mystery that provides spiritual nourishment for the journey. Only by receiving this spiritual nourishment regularly can we be strengthened in our faith, which will allow us to endure all the challenges to our faith in Jesus that we will face in this world.

By setting a New Year's resolution to begin a spiritual journey with these simple practices, we will begin to see the fruits of this effort working in all that we do. As you start down this path, the Spirit of the Lord will guide and strengthen you and perfect you in the love of God. Your heart will be open and your ears will hear. You will be eager and joyous in serving our heavenly Father. Amen.

Mt. Nebo has many opportunities and ministries for you to practice serving those in our community and congregation. I find that service to others gives satisfaction and joy in my own life.

Micah's Backpack is an ongoing ministry to serve children in our area who experience food insecurity. Currently 157 children in our area are

being helped by this ministry. In December, we had an extra opportunity to pack for those children. Since it was a Sunday, the children and youth of our church were able to help and learn about serving! Nineteen of us cheerfully were helpers on December 14. Thanks to all of the families who participated. Every month, an opportunity is given to Mt. Nebo for this important ministry. We are helpers on the first Wednesday of every month at 1:00 p.m. We meet at Trinity Lutheran Church to pack and deliver the food bags to the schools. Packing takes about 40 minutes, which is not a large amount of time to commit, but often we stay to help prepare for the following week, as well as deliver to 3 or 4 schools. Let us begin to focus on another way that our congregation can help since not everyone is available in the afternoon. Beginning in January, I will have a container in the Gathering Room for us to donate items that are used weekly for this ministry. I would like to set aside the first Sunday of the month for these collections. That enables me to deliver those supplies on the week that we volunteer. For January, please consider donating individual popcorn bags. We will have a different item each month, which will be announced in church and in the Happenings.

We have been blessed during the month of December with our annual Advent Bible Study, which was called "Advent, A Season of Surprises." Of course, the first week focused on Mary's surprise

This fundraiser helps us to be able to give to the various charities. We also sponsor the

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

#### The Blessing of a Blended Worship Service

In congregations across the United Methodist Church, worship is the heartbeat of community life. Yet, as churches grow more diverse in terms of age, background, and worship preferences, many leaders face an ongoing question: How can we create a service that welcomes everyone? One solution increasingly embraced is the blended worship service—a worship experience that intentionally incorporates both traditional hymns and contemporary praise music. Far from being a compromise, blended worship can be a powerful expression of unity, vitality, and spiritual depth.

#### 1. Honoring the Heritage of the Church

Hymns form the rich musical backbone of Methodist tradition. Rooted in Scripture and theology, the hymns of Charles Wesley and other historic writers teach, convict, and encourage. Including hymns in worship keeps the theological foundation of the denomination alive, connects congregants with the historical continuity of their faith, and engages worshippers who draw strength and familiarity from traditional liturgy.

Blended worship demonstrates that the church values its heritage—not as a relic of the past, but as a living voice still shaping disciples today.

#### 2. Embracing New Expressions of Faith

Praise choruses and modern worship music resonate deeply with younger generations, as well as with those who connect spiritually through contemporary language and musical styles. Contemporary worship reflects the present-day movement of the Spirit, offers accessible, repetitive lyrics that foster reflection and heartfelt response,

and broadens the church's musical vocabulary.

United Methodists have always been an "open" people, eager to spread the gospel by new and innovative means. Incorporating praise music reflects that same evangelistic spirit.

#### 3. Encouraging Intergenerational Worship

Many churches struggle to bring generations together. Music can be one of the strongest unifying or dividing forces in a congregation. A blended service creates a natural meeting place where children and teens experience the strength and beauty of hymnody, older adults witness and participate in the energy of contemporary praise, and families worship together without being split by stylistic preferences.

This shared worship experience builds understanding, reduces tension, and strengthens the bonds of Christian community.

#### 4. Supporting a Theologically Balanced Service

Traditional hymns often provide rich, doctrinally grounded lyrics, while contemporary songs tend to be emotionally expressive and relational. Together, they create a fuller theological and spiritual experience. Hymns teach and proclaim truth, while praise songs respond in adoration and devotion. Together they engage the worshipper's mind, heart, and spirit. This balances the Wesleyan emphasis on "knowledge and vital piety"—understanding God and experiencing God.

#### 5. Reaching a Broader Community

For visitors, a blended service can feel immediately welcoming; those from traditional backgrounds feel at home with familiar hymns, while those from contemporary or non-church backgrounds connect with modern praise. Seekers then experience a church that embraces diversity and avoids rigid gatekeeping.

A blended service communicates hospitality: "There is room for you here."

#### 6. Encouraging Congregational Participation

Different types of music invite participation in

different ways:Hymns encourage strong congregational singing and unity, contemporary songs often inspire movement, clapping, or expressive worship.

By offering both, the church cultivates a dynamic environment where people can worship authentically in various modes.

#### Conclusion

A blended United Methodist worship service is more than a mix of old and new songs—it is a testimony to a unified, Spirit-led community. It honors the past while embracing the future. It nurtures disciples of all ages. It reflects the inclusive, grace-filled identity of the church.

In a world that often fractures along lines of preference and style, a blended service models the reconciling love of Christ—showing that the church can lift many voices while still singing one song of praise.
